CALL TO ORDER:

At 6:00 pm Mr. Moran called the town board meeting to order with the pledge of allegiance. Mr. Moran explained that he will be facilitating the meeting in the absence of Supervisor Tomaino. As you can see Mr. Poné is also absent from the meeting, three voting members constitutes a quorum. With the necessary quorum this meeting can go forward.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Mr. Jay Bergin, President of the Central Oswego County Riders, Mr. Barry Green and Mr. Brian Clark are members and would like to speak on the organization's behalf. Mr. Bergin brought with him a letter requesting the board allow ATVs on designated roads as follows: From the recreational trail north 1.75 miles on Cook Road to 1.9 miles on Roosevelt Road, left on Center Street for 3.2 miles. The Central Oswego County Riders is a new organization that is looking to open and offer more riding trails around Oswego County. They are going to mirror what Lewis County has in place. The club has purchased insurance for \$1M - \$2M liability, this insurance does cover non-members, but if you are not a member and you are on the trail, you are concerned trespassing. Mr. Bergin did supply the board with a rider from the insurance policy. With no more questions, this topic was tabled until Mr. Bader could review the rider.

The County has prepared an IMA (Intermunicipal Agreement) between the County and Towns that are looking to join the project. Mr. Bader, Town Attorney, is currently reviewing the IMA for Constantia. Once Mr. Bader has approved the IMA, the Town will need a meeting to authorize Supervisor Tomaino to sign the IMA. This meeting must be before September 11th as that is when the County has the IMA on the agenda. A tentative meeting was scheduled for September 10th.

Mr. Clark also brought with him the following resolution that will need to be signed for the sewer grant applications. With no questions, the following was offered.

WHEREAS, The Town of Constantia (Town) is proposing the North Shore Sewer Project (Project), located in the Town of Constantia, Oswego County, New York: and

WHEREAS, the Town will apply for grant funds from the Northern Borders Regional Commission (NBRC) for the Project:

RESOLVED, that the Town Supervisor is hereby authorized, on behalf of the Town of Constantia, to apply for, accept and expend grant funds from the Northern Borders Regional Commission (NBRC). The Town Supervisor has permission to sign all NBRC investment documents that bind the application.

The foregoing resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

CODE ENFORCEMENT:

Mr. Dolan and Mr. Hamacher were invited to the meeting to discuss a conference call between Mr. Tomaino, Mr. Dolan and Ms. Heins from the Department of State. The conference call was set up to discuss issues with property located in the panther lake area. The properties in question were all owned by the same individual until his death. These properties have a long list of complaints, Ms. Heins feels there are deficiencies in the town of Constantia code enforcement program. Ms. Heins sent over a model local law that she is encouraging the Town to pass. Mr. Moran is not in favor of passing the law, the town of Constantia has a Land Development Law that was thoughtfully put together. Mr. Moran believes this is a NYS mandate that is looking to take away the Town's right to govern ourselves. After a short discussion, the board members agree it is not necessary to pass the local law sent by the Department of State.

PARK AND RECREATION:

At the July 15th town board meeting Mrs. Zehr presented the following document for consideration. There has been a bit of confusion as to the role of the Park and Recreation Commission. The Commission the following document together in hopes to clarify any lingering issues. The board members requested Mr. Bader review the document for consideration at the August meeting. Mr. Bader has no issues with the document and with no other discussion, Mr. Donegan made the motion to accept the following as the role of the park and recreation commission, seconded by Mr. Chapman.

CLARIFYING THE ROLE OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Over the past several months, the Parks and Recreation Commission has been mistakenly referred to as a committee instead of a Commission. This mislabeling has led to confusion around our role and responsibilities. We'd like to take this opportunity to clarify who we are and how we've operated for nearly 50 years — with the goal of continuing to serve our town's parks in the most effective way possible.

What's the Difference?

A committee is usually a smaller group within a larger organization, like a board or town council. Committees tend to focus on specific tasks or issues and often make recommendations, but they don't usually have the authority to make final decisions on their own. They report back to the larger body for approval.

A commission, on the other hand, is typically an independent body with broader responsibilities. Commissions are set up to manage specific areas of local government — things like parks, planning, or zoning. They often have decision-making power, manage budgets, oversee staff, and help resolve issues within their area.

Why This Matters

Local commissions are created to ensure certain areas of town government run smoothly and are managed by people with relevant experience. They are granted the authority to make decisions, manage operations and budgets, oversee their area of dedication, and carry out the mission they were created for.

This is exactly how the Parks and Recreation Commission has functioned for decades. We've taken care of the town's parks, handled budgeting, addressed maintenance and staffing needs, and made thoughtful decisions to support our community spaces. Issues regarding the Parks should be handled by the Commission, as it was designed and created, to allow the Town Board the freedom to handle other areas that need their attention.

Our Request

We're asking that the Parks and Recreation Commission be recognized and referred to as a commission as it always has been recognized, not a committee, moving forward. This clarification is important not only for accuracy but also to ensure we can continue doing the work we were set up to do — effectively, responsibly, and in service to the people of this town.

The Parks and Recreation Commission is an appointed body responsible for overseeing the planning, operations, budgeting, and policies related to the Town's parks and recreational programs and property — including the David C. Webb Memorial Park at Taft Bay. The Commission acts as a liaison between residents and the Town Board, working to ensure safe, accessible, and well-managed community spaces and events.

CORE RESPONSIBILITIES

Budget Oversight

The Commission is responsible for assisting in the maintenance of and monitoring all four Parks and Recreation budget lines. It ensures expenditures stay within approved limits and provides regular budget updates during monthly meetings.

Park Management and Oversight

The Commission works directly with the Park Director on all park-related matters. The Commission is dedicated to help and assist the Park Director in any way, as the Director role is a very busy and active job. Any issues raised by the Park Director must first be brought to the Commission for resolution. If further action is needed, the Commissioner is responsible for taking the issue to the Town Board, Supervisor, or Bookkeeper.

Personnel Supervision

While the Park Director hires and manages seasonal staff (ie summer rec employees), the Commission oversees the Director's performance and direction.

Program and Activity Approval

The Commission approves all events and activities at the park. The Park Director may propose programs, but nothing is implemented without Commission approval. The Commission also takes suggestions from the public into consideration and discussion and may also suggest events based on public feedback.

Policy Authority

All park policies — such as rules for lifeguards, uniform standards, or public use guidelines — must be reviewed and approved by the Commission before they take effect. No changes are made without Commission discussion and formal agreement.

Governance Process

The Commission is the first point of contact for all park issues. Only when a matter cannot be resolved within the Commission will it be brought to the Town Board or other municipal officials.

EXTENDED RESPONSIBILITIES

Community Engagement

The Commission gathers public input through meetings and events and acts as a liaison between residents and the Town regarding park matters.

Planning and Capital Improvements

The Commission contributes to long-term park planning and recommends facility upgrades, new features (like restrooms or playgrounds), and usage improvements based on community needs.

Interdepartmental and External Collaboration

It works with other Town departments, local organizations, and regional partners to coordinate park use, maintenance, and events.

Grants and Fundraising

The Commission identifies potential funding opportunities, including grants and sponsorships, to support park improvements and programming. The Commission can apply for grants, with the approval and knowledge of the Town Board.

Risk Management and Safety

The Commission helps review safety policies, helps the Park Director to ensure staff certifications (e.g., lifeguards), and maintain emergency preparedness.

Recordkeeping and Reporting

It keeps accurate records of meetings, policy decisions, and communications, and provides reports to the Town Board summarizing activities and recommendations. The Commission is required to meet once a month to discuss issues as they arise, look at the budgets, and help with the effectiveness of the parks programs.

CONCLUSION

The Constantia Parks and Recreation Commission serves as the central body for planning, managing, and improving the Town's Park and recreation services. Its authority includes budget oversight, program planning, policy development, and community engagement—ensuring that parks remain safe, inclusive, and responsive to the needs of residents.

Mr. Moran brought up the question if the town's park program application should have a hold harmless statement that the participants should sign. Mr. Moran goes to the local senior program; they encouraged members to attend senior camp thru the County of Oswego. The application had a hold harmless statement; Mrs. Zehr requested the wording so she could add it to the application.

HIGHWAY:

Mr. Whitney reported the following:

- o Paving is done for the year.
- O CHIPs reimbursement has been submitted for \$275,000. the Town should expect payment sometime in September. A second request for around \$40,000 will be submitted for the fourth quarter. There will be about \$250,000 carryover in CHIPs spending for 2025.
- o Mr. Whitney will be looking to purchase a crack sealer, the one they have is not working correctly.
- O The men are painting both buildings closest to the road.
- Mr. Whitney will be looking for quotes for a new waste oil furnace and a wood boiler, both are getting
 old and starting to have problems. More information to follow when quotes are received.
- O Contacting Safelight for pricing to remove contaminated oil, the Town has no way to remove this waste.
- O Hauling sand, ditching and doing tree work until winter.

Mrs. Zehr asked Mr. Whitney if the highway department could fix the sign at the park, it is tipping over. Mr. Whitney is aware and has a plan to straighten. The tree that was planted in the fall has died, Lasnicki's Landscaping will be replacing.

Mrs. LaVigne asked about sidewalks down Frederick's Street, people are using the sidewalks, and it would be nice to have a loop completed. Mr. Whitney would hate to put in the sidewalks for them to be torn up for the sewers, a few big trees will need to be removed as well. Mr. Whitney will get pricing together for consideration.

After discussion on pre-paying for the new pickup truck to save \$5,000.00 as offered by Allegiance Truck, the board decided against this option.

COUNTY LEGISLATOR:

Mr. Reehil reported:

- The County does support the Central Oswego County Riders, ATV's are very good for tourism.
- Mr. Reehil was very excited to learn about the \$8.1M the County was awarded for the Industrial Park. This is important because it puts Oswego County on the map for new businesses. Shovel ready projects are so important.
- > The County is also being considered for the next generation nuclear power plant.
- ➤ Poll workers will be getting a \$50 raise.
- Youth hunting bill has not been presented yet.

TOWN OF CONSTANTIA LOCAL LAW NO. A OF 2025

("A Local Law Overriding the Tax Levy Limit Established in General Municipal Law §3-c in the Town of Constantia")

Councilman Moran introduced proposed Local Law No. A-2025, relating to the ability of the Town of Constantia to override the limit on the amount of real property taxes that may be levied by the Town of Constantia pursuant to General Municipal Law §3-c, and to allow the Town of Constantia to adopt a Town budget for the fiscal year 2026 in excess of the "tax levy limit," if necessary, and made the following motion, which was seconded by Councilman Chapman:

WHEREAS, no other agency has the legal authority or jurisdiction to approve or directly undertake the enactment of a local law in the Town of Constantia, such that there are no other involved agencies within the meaning of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQR) with respect to the proposed enactment of said Local Law, with the result that the Town Board shall act as lead agency in this matter; and

WHEREAS, the adoption to said Local Law is an unlisted action for purposes of environmental review under SEQR; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has determined that a short environmental assessment form (EAF) shall be required in connection with this matter; and

WHEREAS, the said EAF has been prepared and has been reviewed by the Town Board; and WHEREAS, the Town Board has considered the adoption of said Local Law, has considered the criteria contained in 6 N.Y.C.R.R. Part 617.7 and has compared the impacts which may be reasonably expected to result from the adoption of said Local Law against said criteria.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is

RESOLVED AND DETERMINED, that the enactment of proposed Local Law No. A-2025 is an unlisted action, there are no other involved agencies and this Board shall act as lead agency in this matter for purposes of SEQR review; and it is further

RESOLVED AND DETERMINED, the Town Board has determined this action shall have no significant adverse impact on the environment; that, accordingly, an environmental impact statement (EIS) shall not be required; and that this resolution shall constitute a negative declaration under SEQR; and it is further
